# Coexistence in the Middle East – Winter Session REALITIES OF THE MIDDLE EAST: CONFLICT AND NEGOTIATIONS

Our intensive two-week winter session offers 3-credits and includes many of the field trips and lectures as the <u>full summer session</u>. This program is aimed at students, faculty members, diplomats, policy makers, and other professionals who are unable to attend the <u>Coexistence in the Middle East</u> (CME) summer program.

### **Course Description**

This course focuses upon the topic of negotiations and conflict resolution in the context of the Arab-Israeli conflict since 1977 to the present. The course is divided into three parts. First, we will present the general theoretical framework for explaining and understanding negotiations in international relations. Second, we will refer in general terms to the history of the Arab-Israeli conflict and the main issues and patterns of negotiations, with reference to the larger Middle East context. Third, we will address several case-studies of successes and failures of negotiations between Israel and its Arab neighbors – Egypt, Syria, Lebanon, Jordan, and the Palestinians. In this context, we will attempt to understand the relative failure of the peace process between Israelis and Palestinians.

The class lectures will be complemented by a variety of study trips and encounters that enable participants to explore the facts on the ground and examine local realities from the perspectives of various religious, political, cultural and national groups that converge at this crossroads of humanity. The field trips are organized in cooperation with the International Institute of Leadership and delve into:

- Encounters between the "West" and the Middle East
- Relations among Christians, Jews, and Muslims
- Interests and concerns of the International Community
- Competing claims between Israelis and Palestinians

### Topics and Schedule of Classes

- 1. Introduction and theoretical framework: international conflict/conflict management, negotiations and mediation; peaceful territorial change. Historical background of the Israeli-Palestinian Conflict.
  - 2. The Middle Eastern context: The Arab-Israeli conflict in the larger context.
  - 3. Case-studies of negotiations: Israel-Egypt/Israel-Jordan; Israel-Lebanon; Israel-Syria.
  - 4. The Israeli-Palestinian conflict and the peace process, from 1967 to the present.
- 5. The present and future of the Israeli-Palestinian conflict; analysis and summary. Presentation of ideas for papers.

- Middle East scholars and experts

### Field Trips

- Borders with Syria and Lebanon
- "Security Fence"/"Occupation Wall"
- Sderot and the Border with Gaza
- NGOs and Government Institutions
- The Sea of Galilee and Nazareth
- The Dead Sea and Masada

### **Grading & Course Requirements**

The course will be held in English or Spanish according to group requirements. No previous experience or knowledge is necessary and the course is open to every individual with interest in the contemporary Middle East. Participants who do not require academic credits will be exempt from these requirements and will be able to obtain an active participation certificate.

### Students' grades

- 20% Reading and class participation
- 80% Term Paper. The essay will not exceed 3000 words and must be submitted no later than three weeks after the last class in word format electronically. Papers should be submitted through the website of the course, or directly to arie.kacowicz@mail.huji.ac.il.

It is mandatory for students to attend all classes, guest lectures, and field trips. Failure to attend classes will result in a student being denied the right to partake in the final assignment and receive a final grade in the course. Students who have a justified reason to miss class (illness, mourning, etc.) must communicate with their instructors and the Department of Summer Courses and Special Programs, and complete the material that they have missed. Students who have missed class due to illness must obtain a signed and stamped sick note from a treating physician and submit it to the Dept. of Summer Courses and Special Programs immediately following their return to class. Failure to do so will result in an unexcused absence. The Department reserves the right to refer the issue to an Academic Committee. In some cases, the Academic Committee may decide, in light of the requirements of the course, that it is not possible to make up the missing course work.

- Graduate students must complete a 15-page, double-spaced term paper with bibliography for the course. The topic and bibliography for these papers must be chosen in conjunction and agreement with the course's instructor.
- The seminar paper must make use of at least five scholarly sources (books or academic articles), in addition to internet resources.
- The graduate seminar papers must be submitted within 2 months following course completion in order for the graduate student to fulfill requirements for this course.
